Course Purpose and Objectives	A writing class designed to introduce students to the practice of writing for academic purposes through a creative process. Drawing from literary text types and experimenting with creative writing, the course aims to provide a broad view on writing and offer students the skills and confidence involved. Furthermore, the course also provides students with basic academic writing skills including: formulating research questions, finding literature, managing academic literature, paraphrasing, making a summary, building a comprehensive argumentation, adding in-body citation and compiling bibliography using different citation systems.

Teaching Methodology	Lectures and workshops. Every week the students will be presented with background information on academic and creative writing and will be assigned relevant exercises to do in class as well as writing assignments as homework. Selected assignments will be peer-reviewed in class. In the final writing assignment of the course the students will be asked to compile and hand in a full scientific article (c. 3000 words). Audio-visual aids, class discussions, pair and group work and other methods will be used to keep students' interest alive and elicit their maximum participation.
